

# **Coffee Filter Heart Suncatchers**

These suncatchers make wonderful decorations as well as gifts!

#### What you need:

- Large coffee filters
- Scissors
- Watercolor paints and brush OR food coloring mixed with water in a small cup
- An eyedropper
- Cookie sheet or tray
- Paper towels
- Tape

Cut out heart shapes from your coffee filters. You can make them different sizes for extra fun. Once you have a few ready, drop or paint colors onto the filters. Make sure you have a tray or cookie sheet underneath. Place them on a cookie sheet/tray lined with paper towels and let them dry. Might take a few hours. Once they are dry, tape them in a window! Think of family, friends, neighbors and community members you can bring them to. It will brighten their day – and their window!







# **Paper Heart Chains**

#### What you need:

- Paper (construction or scrapbook paper is wonderful but any paper works!)
- Scissors
- Yarn or ribbon
- Stapler
- Hole punch

Cut out 1-inch strips of paper. Take one of your strips and fold it exactly in half the long way. Bend the two ends into a heart shape at the top and staple together. (Grown-ups might want to staple!) Punch a hole at the top and the bottom of the heart. Thread some yarn or ribbon through each hole. You can add as many hearts as you wish to your chain. When you are finished, tie a knot at the end. Think about taking some of these heart chains to a local retirement home as a decoration for Valentine's Day or anytime!





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
